

Sermon Title: Summer Series 24: Eternity of God and God's Infinitude

Scripture: Psalm 90:1-2

- 1. Have you ever heard or used the word "unlimited" (i.e. unlimited energy, unlimited wealth, etc.)? What do we mean when we make this statement?
- 2. What does associating this psalm with Moses add to your appreciation of it? How does that increase the meaning of verse 1?
- 3. Time is part of God's creation. "In all generations" (Psalm 90:1) and "before" (Psalm 90:2) speak to parts of God's creation.
- 4. God has been the dwelling place for His people <u>IN</u> all generations. God is as much a dwelling place for His people today as when Moses led Israel out of Egypt, through the wilderness, and when writing this psalm. What does that mean for you?
- 5. For God, time does not pass; time remains. This means that God never hurries because there are no deadlines since time does not pass for Him. How does this help you to pray and trust God when time grinds to a halt in difficult moments?
- 6. Psalm 90:2 describes God as "from everlasting to everlasting." A.W. Tozer rephrases this statement: "God dwells in eternity but time dwells in God. He has already lived all our tomorrow as He has lived all our yesterdays." How does that impact your past, present, and future?
- 7. "Everlasting to everlasting" also describes God's infinitude. Our limited minds can't grasp God's unlimitedness. What have you found helpful to make sense of this attribute of God?
- 8. God is not just infinite in His bounds; all aspects of God are infinite. A.W. Tozer describes the love of God like this. "His love is measureless. It is more: it is boundless. It has no bounds because it is not a thing but a facet of the essential nature of God. His love is something He is, and because He is infinite that love can enfold the whole created world in itself and have room for ten thousand times ten thousand worlds beside." Discuss the supreme scope of this quote.
- 9. How do you desire to know the eternity of God and God's infinitude more fully?
