- 1. What topic do you know the most about? What level of expertise would you assign to your knowledge?
- 2. Who is the most knowledgeable person on the topic you just shared? What gap is there between their knowledge and yours?
- 3. Let's read Psalm 139 together. How does it depict God as knowing everything?
- 4. A.W. Tozer, speaking of God's omniscience says, "To say that God is omniscient is to say that He possesses perfect knowledge and therefore has no need to learn. But it is more: it is to say that God has never learned and cannot learn." How does that contribute to what you just read in Psalm 139?
- 5. How does the fact that God knows you intimately (Psalm 139:1-6) affect you?
- 6. Why does it make no sense to try to run from God but perfect sense to run to God (Psalm 139:7-12)?
- 7. How does this psalm ask you to see your body and other people's bodies (Psalm 139:13-16)?
- 8. As we reflect on these three categories, A.W. Tozer states, "Because God knows all things perfectly, He knows no one thing better than any other thing, but all things equally well." What does that mean for the three topics we just discussed? All topics?
- 9. Psalm 139 does not hide the negative thoughts of the psalmist in verses 19-22. What does this mean for our relationship with God? Our relationship with others? Our relationship with those who have wronged us?
- 10. God's thoughts towards the psalmist's enemies and the wicked are the same thoughts that God has towards the psalmist. How does this influence your understanding of God's love toward your enemies?
- 11. Let's read Psalm 139:23-24. Rather than simply reading it together, let's form it in a prayer over our lives. Ask God to search you and know your heart. What is in your heart that He will see?
