## *Discussion Questions*

**Sermon Title:** Worship Matters: What Do I Love?

**Scripture:** Psalm 66

1. Were you able to attend Harbor Trinity this past Sunday? What did you think of the changes that were made during the service?
2. While we have a tendency to focus on functional changes, did you notice anything different in your and your response in worship in light of these changes? Does that have any impact on your opinion of the service?
3. *“Worship is how we respond to what we love most.”* This is a line we will get very familiar with during our summer series. Is this how you would define worship?
4. If you were to ask people closest to you (family, friends, coworkers, neighbors) what you love most, what would they say? How do they know you love those things most?
5. How does your answer in how you respond and how they would know influence how you respond in worship to God? Does it encourage or discourage you?
6. As we begin our time in Psalm 66, let’s take a moment where we read it together.
7. Psalm 66 is titled, *“How Awesome Are Your Deeds.”* It begins with a **big** response. Shout, sing, and give glorious praise with a lot of exclamation points. Has this type of worshipful response been true for you? Why or why not? If so, when and why?
8. How do we know from Psalm 66 that the Lord loves the whole world? Why is this helpful to us when others are critical of the Old Testament God who just wants to smite everyone vs. Loving Jesus?
9. Psalm 66:5-7 invites others to *“come and see what God has done”* and then tells of God’s faithful acts. What part can you have in sharing with others in the same way that *“all the earth”* (Psalm 66:1, 4) may worship Him?
10. Have you ever prayed a, *“God if you [blank], then I will [blank]”* prayer? These are the exact circumstances of Psalm 66:8-15. What was the psalmist’s response in these verses? How did you respond?
11. Let’s listen to how Psalm 66 ends. Verses 16-20 highlight an important transition from verses 8-15. As we have all come to our together today, and we have all been hearing from Scripture, let’s take a moment to *“tell what he has done for my soul”* (Psalm 66:16). In the old days, these were called testimony services. Let’s testify about all that God has done for us together.
12. Psalm 66:20 is an incredible promise. *“[God] has not rejected my prayer or removed his steadfast love for me.”* There are plenty of reasons why God could, but He has not. What have your prayers been recently? How do you see God responding? How can we continue to pray for you?
13. Let’s end our time in prayer for one another.
