Sermon Title: Summer Series 26: Magnifies the Greatness of God

Scripture: Psalm 145

1. One remarkable feature of Psalm 145 is the way it uses so many different words for “worship.” How many different words can you identify?
2. Why would David choose to use so many different words for worship? Why is this important as we consider how and why we worship?
3. Psalm 145 follows an acrostic pattern in the Hebrew alphabet. Each verse begins with a letter of the Hebrew alphabet, from Aleph to Tav, “to magnify the greatness of God from A to Z.” Can you build an acrostic identifying God’s characteristics based on the word “GREAT”?
4. Further still, Psalm 145 addresses the enduring nature of worship. “Forever and ever” (Psalm 145:1, 2, 21), “every day” (Psalm 145:2), the “generations” (Psalm 145:4, 13), and “everlasting” (Psalm 145:13). Does your current response reflect the endless nature of worship? Why or why not?
5. “Great is the LORD...Greatly to be praised...his greatness is unsearchable” (Psalm 145:3). God is so great, we cannot search to find the end. David’s response is that His greatness is worthy of great praise. How do you respond greatly to God?
6. Harbor Trinity is a multi-generational neighborhood church and preschool. Psalm 145:4 declares, “One generation shall commend your works to another, and shall declare your mighty acts.” How have previous generations (even beyond Harbor Trinity) been faithful to declare God’s works to you? How have you, and how will you, be faithful to declare God’s works to the generations that are coming after you?
7. Have you ever considered volunteering with Kids Church (Sunday mornings), Kids Club (Wednesday nights), or Youth (Middle School and High School on Wednesday nights) as an act of worship and fulfillment of this verse? Why or why not?
8. Meditation is looked down upon in some circles. How does David meditate in Psalm 145:5? How are we able to meditate in the same way?
9. Psalm 145:7-9 brings forth a specific aspect of God’s character: His goodness. Let’s read these verses and reflect on the extent of God’s goodness.
10. Psalm 145:18-19 promises, “The LORD is near to all who call on him, to all who call on him in truth. He fulfills the desire of those who fear him; he also hears their cry and saves them.” How has this been evident in your life? How are you praying for it to be true today?
